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About the conference

With Ireland's signing of the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, the rights of people with intellectual disabilities, including their right to respect for relationships and sexuality, have come increasingly to the fore. However, translating acknowledgement of rights into proactive support remains a key challenge, and people with intellectual disabilities have highlighted that they face many barriers in this area of their lives. For families and disability services, a crucial issue is how to empower people with intellectual disabilities with regard to relationships and sexuality, and yet at the same time, ensure that they are safe. Many have cited difficulties with Irish legislation in this area.

This inclusive conference brings together a number of Irish and international experts who will explore sexuality as a rights issue and look at support needs of people with intellectual disabilities, family members and staff. Presentations will also highlight a number of new and interesting support initiatives that aim to address needs in this area. This will be a practical, empowering day, encouraging debate and offering advice on how to tackle this sensitive, but important issue.
